THE NEEDLES.

AND THE **GRAVE**



Have you ever noticed how remnants from holiday decorations seem to hang around for months? Every year, it seems like we vacuum Christmas tree needles until spring. For weeks after Easter, we find pieces of the plastic grass from our crafts scattered throughout the house. Though these remnants can be a nuisance, they bring joy as they remind us of special holiday memories.

In 2007, I visited the ancient places of the Bible-the grass where Jesus fed five thousand and the place believed to be Peter's living room. I was baptized in the Jordan River, preached on the Mount of Olives and stood inside the grave where lesus was buried called the Garden Tomb.

The stone that was the door to the tomb has long been carried away by tourists, but what remains left me speechless. The Romans sealed the tomb by driving a steel rod the diameter of a man's finger through the stone and into the bedrock-the remnant of which remains to this day. The end looks ripped off rather than evenly cut as though the power of God just tore it apart. I also saw the trench carved into the base of the hill that once held the stone. The trench is cut on an angle that leads uphill away from the door making the stone easy to roll shut but difficult to open. Viewing the tomb, it is understandable why the women were concerned about who would roll the heavy stone away that Resurrection Morning.

As I entered the tomb, I had to stoop down as Peter and John did when they entered. I saw the place where Jesus was laid and the place where the angel sat. As I thought about the impact Jesus' resurrection would have on our world, I cried. It affirmed my faith in Jesus as the possessor of all power in heaven and in earth. If Jesus sheared the steel rod that sealed Him in and rolled the enormous stone uphill, then surely He could break every chain and every stronghold that held me bound.

I saw His empty grave and pondered my own mortality. Jesus proved that He was the Resurrection and the Life. There is a grave that will be mine one day, but it will not hold me forever. Jesus will call me forth and this mortal body will become immortal in the moment in the twinkling of an eye (I Corinthians 15:52-54). Until then, my hope, my dreams, my peace and my joy will never have to die because I serve a living Savior.

The needles and the grass may bring back holiday memories, but they are eventually vacuumed away. However, the physical remnants of the Resurrection Morning remain to this day. The spiritual power they represent should inspire us to walk daily in the power of Jesus Christ. We must never let the devil vacuum away our memory of the grave. It is a holiday remnant worth keeping.

SALVATION

Salvation is a gift that is made available to anyone. But first we must repent, believe and confess that Jesus is Lord and that He died and rose from the dead. (Acts 16:31; Romans 10:9-10). This gift is not earned through good deeds or even by being a good person (Ephesians 2:8; 1 Timothy 1:9). It is a matter of faith. Faith is acting out on what you believe according to God's Word concerning salvation.

Salvation comes from the Greek word soteria, which means "deliverance, preservation and safety." It primarily involves deliverance from the bondage of sin (Romans 9:20-23; Galatians 5:1). Salvation also includes deliverance from enemies (Luke 1:71) and sickness and disease (Isaiah 53:4 The Amplified Bible; Matthew 8:17; 1 Peter 2:24).

The following steps will help you obtain and maintain the salvation experience. It involves a process that will not only guarantee you entrance to heaven, but also position you to experience the benefits of heaven on earth.

1. Recognize/Admit That You Are a Sinner.

Because of Adam's sin of disobedience in the Garden of Eden, all of humanity was affected by, and infected with, sin (Romans 5:12-14). Mankind took on the nature of sin. Therefore, everyone that was born after Adam was born into a life of sin and death (Psalm 51:5).

2. Repent of Your Sins.

To repent simply means to "change one's mind; to change one's direction; to have a change of heart." It involves making a 180-degree turn away from sin and heading in the right direction toward God.

Repentance does not mean "I'm sorry." It is a quality decision to ask forgiveness of your sins, turning away from ungodly living and submitting to God's will for your life (1 John 1:9).

3. Confess Jesus as Lord and Savior.

Confession affirms Jesus' lordship (place of authority) over your life. Confess that He is your Lord and believe that He lived, died and was raised from the dead for the forgiveness of your sins.

4. Be Baptized in Water

Water baptism is a symbolic representation of Jesus' death, burial and resurrection. Just as He was baptized, so must you be baptized (Matthew 3:6). You go down into the water, carrying your old man (lifestyle) with you, and die to yourself and your old way of living (Romans 6:3-11). When you come up out of the water, you are a "new" person.

When you become born again, the Holy Spirit takes up residence in your heart to become your Teacher, Comforter and Guide through life (John 14:15-17, 23, 26).

5. Obey the Word of God.

Maintaining your salvation and enjoying its benefits is done by living according to God's Word (Proverbs 3:1-4; 1 John 5:3). Make His Word the final authority by which you live. Make sure every decision you make in life is biblically based. The Word must be your foundation.

Conversations WITH

When you think about a conversation, what is the first image that comes to your mind? Imagine two friends chatting over coffee. Recall a recent conversation with your child about their day at school. Think about a father giving advice to his son. Prayer is a simple conversation with God that is intimate, heartfelt and sincere. Prayer does not require a degree in theology or extensive knowledge of the Bible—you can use your own words. Here are a few tips to experience *divine* results and a greater relationship with God.

God Hears Your Prayers. Jesus has qualified you to talk to the Father. He longs to commune with you. Draw near to God through prayer.

Focus on His Goodness. Center your attention on all He is doing and all He has done. Focusing on His goodness will stir up genuine praise and moments of worship while in His presence.

Make Time. Don't Find Time. Prioritize your time so that God is first. The amount of time you spend in prayer is not what's most important. The sincerity of your heart should be the focus during prayer time. God can do amazing things with a few minutes.

Read His Word; Pray His Word. The depth of our prayer lives will never exceed our understanding of God and His goodness in our lives. Ask God to teach you His ways so that you may know Him.

Ignite a Hunger. Ask God to create a hunger in your heart to passionately pursue Him and encounter Him in a greater way.

Be Authentic. God wants your heart, not your eloquent speech simple prayers are required. Heart-to-heart daily conversations with God matter most.

Take God Out of the Box. Do not limit God. Ask Him each day to do something that will blow your mind. Our God is big. Expect greater!

Receive Blessings. You are worthy to receive God's blessings. Expect them! Receive them!

Reposition Yourself for Answers. When God answers your prayers, He will reposition you to receive the answer. Get ready for your breakthrough!

Hear His voice. When you are listening for God's voice, it can sometimes sound like your own. Ask God to distinguish His voice from your voice and from the enemy's voice.

Believe Again. Despite the disappointment of unanswered prayers in the past, pray as if it were your first prayer request, and believe you have what you have requested.

Divine Strategy. Answers to prayer may not fall out of the sky, but they may come with instructions. Ask God for wisdom, strategy and instructions to help you act upon the answers to your prayers. Be still and listen.

God honors those who diligently seek Him in prayer. Be confident. Expect Him to answer and experience *divine* results!

"And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God." Romans 12:2 (NKJV)

- No weapon formed against you shall prosper, and every tongue which rises against you in judgment you shall condemn. Isaiah 54:17
- Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it. Proverbs 22:6
- No good thing will He withhold from those who walk uprightly. Psalm 84:11c

While we are accustomed to convenience and automation, in God's kingdom nothing is automatic. We must participate. We must put in the time, discipline and consistency necessary to grow spiritually and renew our minds on a daily basis.

In February, Mt. Zion hosted the Relationship Summit, a candid and transparent discussion about love, relationships and marriage. Ordained minister and Senior Vice President of Columbia Tristar Pictures, DeVon Franklin and his wife, Meagan Good, a professed Christian and notable Hollywood actress, were the featured guests.

Question: How do you know if he/she is the one?

DeVonn: Being connected to God...it's the revelation. You feel it. You understand it.

Bishop: When God made Adam, God placed Eve inside of Adam. The spirit of the woman was in the man. Before God would release Eve in the flesh, he had to work on Adam. When Eve was released, Adam knew exactly who she was because he had been carrying her in his spirit. Every man carries the spirit of the woman that God intended for him to be with within him. No matter what the woman's journey has been, no matter what the man's journey has been, you will know. Real intimacy is in-to-me-to-see.

Question: How do you release people into their destiny when their destiny is not you?

Meagan: If their destiny is not you, then your destiny is not them. Lord, I want what You want for me more than I want this for myself. Obedience is everything.

DeVonn: Be upfront about your intentions. Dating outside of destiny is a distraction and is a tool of the enemy.

Bishop: We live in a world where commitment is rare. When we got married, Stephaine determined that were going to get in a box. No matter what happens or how rough it gets, we're staying in the box.

Stephaine: It doesn't mean that it doesn't get hot in the box. Our box has no windows or doors. There's no exit. It can get hot, but you have to decide how long you're going to sit and fester in the heat. Being in the box forces you to figure out ways to turn the temperature down.

Question: What are core values in your marriage?

DeVon: A man should create a healthy environment where we both can grow. Create an environment of grace, mercy and love. Be each other's number one priority.

Meagan: We're designed to help each other. We're designed to make each other better. We're designed to hold up the mirror to each other and hold each other accountable. Simply by being married and committed to each other, we're committing ourselves to God to be better Christians, to fulfill our purpose and to complete our walk the way that we're supposed to specifically because we can help each other be that and do that.

DeVonn: Don't allow the outside environment inside your box.

Question: Marriage is not just the merging of two lives, but the collision of two histories. [What are the] roles [of a husband/wife] in a marriage?

Meagan: Understand your value as a woman. Allowing your husband to help you makes you better, makes you more equipped and makes you stronger and more capable of your purpose.

DeVonn: Unless God gives us our role in our spirit, when we bring preconceived notions about who we were supposed to be and hold each other hostage to that, we're setting ourselves up for immense failure. Be a team when it comes to the domestic aspects of your relationship. spend time in the presence of God so with people/family that are positive and who love God. The company that you keep - Meagan Good you'll meet."





What the Church Can Do

The church led movement of the 1950s and 1960s obtained civil, economic and voting rights gains for minorities. These gains were achieved because people of faith understood that this effort was not against flesh and blood, but this effort was a spiritual movement against principalities and powers in high places; therefore, strong faith was important in this endeavor. In pursuit of equality and justice for all, we need the full armor of God for success. We have faith that God will be with us because the Lord is a God of justice. We know that where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty. If God be for us, who can be against us?

Churches have the power, resources and visibility to marshal efforts and make our voices heard to address social issues. These resources include physical assets like church facilities for community forums as well as the sheer number of people that can be educated and informed on social and political matters. The people can then influence public policy by applying their knowledge in the social and political arena.

To enact change in our communities, churches require spiritual and visionary leaders that advance community needs by recognizing shifts in the world's social and political climate. Such leaders also have the insight to lead the church in addressing community issues that include educational cutbacks, stand your ground gun laws, poor health and income inequality.

Churches with large congregations can have a major impact on election outcomes. Politicians visit during elections because they understand large numbers equal more votes. Even President Barack Obama visited Mt. Zion during his ascent to the White House. Elections affect social policy and, in turn, affect educational and economic opportunities. Hence, they are well positioned to effect positive social change.

Churches can make a difference by collaborating with other churches and community organizations to join efforts on a community issue. To address affordable housing in Nashville, Tennessee, Mt. Zion's New Level Community Development Corporation partners with community organizations to provide housing, home ownership and financial education and access to various resources. Churches can also promote entrepreneurship and job skills development, thus, reducing dependency on public programs.

The goal of social and political action is to further the cause of freedom and justice. As a church, a body of believers, it is our duty to continue to make our voices heard. It is our duty to make a difference.



In the Civil War era, "Sulphur Springs Bottom" was the birthplace of baseball in Nashville, Tennessee. Here, soldiers introduced the northern-style of the game to the locals. Later, in the late 1800s, the area became the home of Nashville's first professional team, the Americans, in the newly formed Southern League. Located in north Nashville and bordered by Fourth Avenue, Fifth Avenue and Jackson Street, legendary sports writer, Grantland Rice, named the site "Sulphur Dell" intentionally acknowledging the aroma from the natural sulphur spring nearby.

In 1932, Sulphur Dell became the center of the African-American baseball scene. Baseball teams from around the country such as the Philadelphia Stars, Birmingham Black Barons and Nashville's own Elite Giants graced Sulphur Dell's outfield bringing sports entertainment to African-American families until Jackie Robinson integrated major league baseball in 1947. The stadium continued to host the games of the Nashville Vols, a minor league team, until the site was demolished in 1969.

50 years later, Jefferson Street will become the center of attention, as Sulphur Dell will become the new home of the Nashville Sounds, Nashville's minor league baseball team. The city council broke ground in January 2014 on a multi-million dollar site with an expected completion date of 2015 in time for the Sound's opening season.

In a press release from the groundbreaking, Mayor Karl Dean stated that the Jefferson Street area would be changed by the new ballpark promising significant economic benefits to the area. In the early 1900s, after the turn of the century, African-American businessmen organized a company to help fellow business owners purchase lots in the Jefferson Street area. It quickly became Nashville's premier business district for African-American patrons. Pharmacies, historically black colleges, salons and funeral homes formed a community in the center of town connecting South Nashville to East Nashville. Nashville's oldest African-American churches such as Mt. Zion Baptist Church and St. John African Methodist Episcopal Church also attracted families to the area for Sunday morning worship and afternoon fellowship at local restaurants. After desegregation and the creation of interstate highways, traffic to the area was diminished causing businesses to struggle and eventually relocate within the city to survive.

In 1994, the Jefferson Street United Merchants Partnership (JUMP) was formed to aid Jefferson Street's business owners—marking the beginning of its revitalization. As of 2013, Jefferson Street now includes business plazas, childcare services, street from their Jefferson Street location to create a state-of-the-art structure housing offices, a childcare facility, a coffee shop and a recreational complex.

restaurants, a coffee house, retail operations, the Bicentennial

Mall and soon urban-style apartment homes. Mt. Zion Baptist Church also plans to redevelop the property across from the Councilwoman Erica Gilmore, District 19, discusses the economic benefits of Sulphur Dell as well upcoming developments on Jefferson Street:

"I am very excited about the development at Sulphur Dell. It is bringing more economic vitality to the area. Additionally, it generates a new enthusiasm for baseball because it was the original location prior to Greer Stadium. A lot of Nashvillians have nostalgia for the area because it is where they went to [baseball] games as kids, listened to concerts or saw the Negro League, [the] Elite Giants, play. In terms of economics, the project is a nearly \$150 million public-private investment in the Jefferson Street/Germantown area. It will provide the connectivity that is needed from Jefferson Street to downtown."

"[A] more than \$50 million dollar investment is being made by the Nashville Sounds for a multi-family/retail development and \$37 million by Embrey Development Corporation for a multi-family development. As a result of this infusion of development, there has been a great interest shown in and around the Jefferson Street area from both private and public investments. Additionally, I sponsored a bill in working with the Mayor's office that created incentives for HCA to bring their subsidiary business, Parallon Business Solutions, to invest more than \$200 million in the area between Charlotte [Avenue] and Jo Johnston [Avenue]. This package will create over 2,000 jobs in the next couple of years. There are more housing options coming to Jefferson Street. This is awesome because it has always been a great place to live because it was so close to town and the history that exists. But now, the secret is out that the Jefferson Street corridor is a great place to live, work and play."

Sulphur Dell, along with continued developments, will restore Jefferson Street to its former glory as the heartbeat of the Nashville community.

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a season of transition

It's been a few months since Bishop Joseph W. Walker, III was selected as the Presiding Bishop-Elect of the Full Gospel Baptist Church Fellowship International (FGBCFI). Our eyes were teary and our hearts were full as we witnessed our Presiding Bishop and Founder, Bishop Paul S. Morton, lay hands on and bless Bishop Walker as our newly appointed Presiding Bishop with a 'double portion' of his anointing.

What does this mean for Bishop Walker and the Mt. Zion Baptist Church family? How will this change impact Mt. Zion? How will it impact Nashville, Tennessee? How will it impact the Fellowship?

FGBCFI is in a season of transition. The birth of the Full Gospel Baptist OF THE FULL GOSPEL BAPTIST CHUICH Church Fellowship International is in essence the story of a tremendous move of God beginning in the last decade of the twentieth century. The essence of the fellowship is encapsulated by the phrase, "The Right to Choose." The right refers to freedom that is based on the belief that the Gospel of Jesus Christ must be promoted by recognizing the free expression of the gifts of the Spirit as a viable part of the Body of Christ. The Fellowship is convinced that the choice to exercise these spiritual gifts are imperative for the local New Testament Church to fully function as the dynamic organism God has intended.

Bishop Walker's vision for FGBCFI, the SHIFT, is forward-thinking and aggressive. The SHIFT acronym is reflective of a five-point platform that focuses on Sustainability, Holiness, Innovation, Family and Transcendence. Transition is defined as change, progression, evolution and transformation. As Bishop Walker steps into the role of Presiding Bishop, the Fellowship aims to Change a Generation by means of a SHIFT.

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LIVING THE LYRICS

Hip-hop music has changed dramatically since the days of old. Artists such as Kurtis Blow, Grandmaster Flash and RUN-DMC inspired young people with positive messages about life in the late 70s and early 80s. Fast forward to the year 2014 where the music is saturated with violence, drugs and sexuality. Are we naïve enough as a society to think that the influential nature of this music would have no adverse effects on our youth? In 1994, rapper Notorious B.I.G. released his debut album entitled *Ready to Die*. In a seductive street melody entitled *Things Done Changed*, he quoted, "Either you're slingin' crack rock or you got a wicked jump shot." The message to the youth of that generation was loud and clear: either sell drugs or become a professional athlete. It's about survival. Unfortunately, twenty years later, the messages that pervade hip-hop lyrics today rarely include aspirations of college or career preparation.

The hypnotic nature of hip-hop music creates conflicting messages for young people—especially males. The idea of having expensive clothes, jewelry, fancy cars and tons of cash has become the new American dream. How does going to college compare with the satisfaction of having fortune and fame? Unfortunately, many young males cannot envision themselves as college graduates. It is clear that the lines between entertainment and reality have been blurred. Additionally, many young males struggle to see anything beyond their everyday circumstances. In essence, they

become prisoners, "entrapped" by their own mindset and low expectations.

It is no secret that our economy has struggled to rebound over the last four years. With that in mind, it benefits all of us to be gainfully employed if we have the ability to work. According to the National Center for Education Statistics, the national unemployment rate for young people ages 20-24 in 2012 was 27.6 percent, 18.3 percent for those whose highest level of education was high school completion, and 12.7 percent for those with some college education, compared with an unemployment rate of only 6.0 percent for those with at least a bachelor's degree. Though it may sound like a cliché, there is real merit to "staying in school." However, African-American males seem to become increasingly more interested in pursuing career paths other than college. In 2010, a national study indicated that of all degrees obtained by African-American students in the U.S., African-American males only received 35 percent of these bachelor's degrees. Additionally, among master's degree candidates, only 29 percent were African-American males compared to 71.1 percent who were African-American females. It is puzzling to understand this trend because of the national push for increased post-secondary degree access for all students.

Hip-hop is speaking to our children louder than we are. In 2004, Kanye West released his debut album entitled The College Dropout. The album was riddled with his personal perspectives on sexuality, organized religion and social injustice. The music was highly influential and controversial. His music defied the notion that young African-American males must go to college to be successful. The album pushed the envelope for what was socially acceptable at the time. Nevertheless, the message sold. The album won a Grammy Award for Best Rap Album and the single Jesus Walks won Best Rap song in 2005. Interestingly enough, a recent report in the Huffington Post prepared by the Sentencing Project based out of Washington, D.C. predicts that one in every three African-American males born today will go to jail at some point in their lifetime—a prediction that is becoming a startling trend. The Word of God teaches us that "faith cometh by hearing", which means that what we repeatedly hear-whether positive or negative-eventually becomes internalized. Therefore, it is imperative that parents, educators and clergy members continue to work in harmony to help our youth discern that which is good and acceptable.

Now that we fully understand the scope of the issues that our students are up against, the question is: How do we begin to resolve these issues?

Having positive influences within the home environment contribute to a student's success. However, students still have choices. There are thousands of examples of students who come from solid homes where both parents are happily married and earn median to high-end incomes, yet their children choose the wrong path for their lives. Mentorship is another key factor. I don't mean having an older pal to hang out with occasionally. I mean having mentorship programs where values are taught, where ideas are exchanged and where accountability exists. A study conducted by Lipscomb University in 2012 indicated that students who had the following risk factors are at a strong disadvantage: born into or currently live in poverty, have parents or siblings who did not complete high school or currently behind academically and have repeated any grade between 1st and 8th grade. In most cases, one's academic standing will dictate whether students choose to attend a four-year school, two year school, technical school or opt not to apply whatsoever. This study further indicated that pre-college/career advising by a college/career mentor significantly increased the likelihood that students would apply for post-secondary opportunities.

Again, it is imperative that we reiterate that as students become older and seek to determine their own identities, there is real merit to having career-oriented mentorship that helps students shape the path for their lives. Local clergy groups, collegiate affiliates, Upward Bound, the Oasis Foundation and the YMCA are just a few of the organizations that provide structured mentorship opportunities.

"...remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, and those who are mistreated as if you yourselves were suffering." Hebrews 13:3 (NIV)

According to the U.S. Bureau of Justice, an estimated 2.2 million individuals are incarcerated in the United States. In 2013, the Department of Correction reported 20,806 inmates incarcerated in Tennessee's adult institutions: 19,345 were males and 1,461 were females. In the state of Tennessee, it costs \$64.72 per day, \$1941.60 per month, to house an inmate whereas it currently costs \$1780 for semester tuition (16 credit hours) at Nashville State Community College—costs resulting in a loss of taxpayer dollars as well as the loss of generations of youth.

The Mt. Zion Prison Ministry was created in 1994 to serve the spiritual needs of incarcerated individuals, ex-offenders and their families through three programs: the Jail Worship Ministry, the Prison to Palace Mentoring Program and the After Care Program.

Jail Worship Ministry

The worship ministry volunteers conduct weekly services at several Davidson County jails. Worship services are held nightly, Monday through Friday, along with weekly Bible study services on Sunday afternoons. Opal Scales, Prison Ministry Overseer, has conducted worship services through the Davidson County Sherriff Department for 32 years.

Prison to Palace Mentoring Program

In this component, volunteers are partnered with inmates to provide mentoring and life-skills coaching. Mentorships can continue after the inmates have been released. The ministry also partners with community organizations that provide support services: Amachi Program, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Diersen Charities, H.U.G.G.S., Leaving the Cocoon, Men of Valor, Monroe Harding, Inc., Project Return and other programs. In addition, a correspondence team sends Bible study materials, words of encouragement and devotions to inmates and ex-offenders monthly.

After Care Ministry

Choosing to mentor an individual who has been incarcerated demonstrates God's love. The Prison Ministry exercises this belief through partnering with community organizations that help ex-offenders make successful transitions back into society. For example, the services provided through this area include: housing needs, transportation, job placement/skills, clothing, and counseling.

While I was in jail for a drug charge, I got saved and began confessing God's Word over my life. I also learned about Mt. Zion and started listening to Bishop's sermons. One day, I prayed and asked God get me out of this situation and help me find work at a church. When I was released, I got a job working part-time on the clean team at Mt. Zion to complete my parole. I also joined the Prison Ministry's classes on Thursdays. When I completed the classes, I felt a need to give back and now, I have an outreach ministry for nonviolent drug offenders. The Prison Ministry uplifted me so I could encourage others. **-Larry Martin**

The incarcerated are society's most forgotten population. Many of these individuals are lonely, fearful and discouraged. However, no one is beyond redemption. The Prison Ministry, along with local support organizations, builds stronger communities by reducing the number of ex-offenders who return to prison. The volunteers and leadership of the Mt. Zion Prison Ministry witness countless inmates and their families redeemed, restored and reconciled through God's love and power. Joe Ravenell has mentored over 15 individuals. He states, "It makes me so happy to see someone [who] loves living in the community and refuses to return to prison." Drug Policy Reform: Giving Nonviolent Offenders A Second Chance

In the 2013 National Drug Policy Strategy, The Obama Administration has taken action to ensure that the most severe mandatory minimum penalties are reserved for serious, high-level, or violent drug traffickers. As a result, the Department of Justice has refined its policies regarding mandatory minimums for certain nonviolent, low-level drug offenders. Specifically, the Attorney General, Eric Holder, has issued guidance to Federal prosecutors indicating they (1) should decline to pursue charges that would trigger a mandatory minimum sentence in the case of certain low-level, non-violent drug offenders; (2) in these cases, consider recommending a below-guidelines sentence to the court if certain criteria are met; and (3) should decline to charge an enhancement that would double the sentence of certain repeat drug offenders unless the defendant is involved in conduct that makes the case appropriate for severe sanctions.

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Lifting the Veil of Silence and Stigma in the Church Vanessa Elliott Bell, PhD, clinical psychologist with the Mt. Zion Oasis of Hope Counseling Ministry, dispels the myths and stigmas associated with depression.



In the Bible, the story of Job is captivating. Job had a loving family, he was wealthy and he was a man of faith. Yet, when he lost everything he had—including his health—he felt the pain of a significant and sudden loss. Job experienced depression. If anyone had a reason to be depressed, it was Job. As Christians, we are not promised a life free of tribulations, sorrows or suffering. In the midst of life's tribulations, we may find ourselves experiencing symptoms of depression. Even Bishop Walker openly shared his experiences with depression after the death of his first wife, Diane Greer Walker.

How can I be both a Christian and depressed?

The scripture teaches us, "I come that you might have life and have it more abundantly." (John 10:10) It also teaches us, "... weeping may endure for a night but joy comes in the morning." (Psalms 30:5) As you meditate on these and other scriptures, you may find that you are still experiencing symptoms of depression: feeling sad or empty, feeling worthless, difficulty falling or staying asleep, a lack of energy, no appetite or binge eating, overwhelming guilt or shame or difficulty concentrating. You may have feelings of just escaping or ending it all. Symptoms of depression can challenge your Christian identity and self-worth. You may ask, "What's wrong with my faith? Am I not praying hard enough? Am I a weak Christian?"

Am I the only one with this condition?

Depression also produces physiological changes in the body with symptoms that can easily be overlooked or ignored such as body aches, fatigue and digestive problems. Well-meaning family members wouldn't dare tell you to "Snap out of that heart disease" or view your gallstones as a sign of a character flaw or a lack of faith. Sadly, little empathy is afforded to those suffering from disorders of the brain and mind. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), depression affects approximately 1 in 10 adults. For example, in a church the size of Mt. Zion with 28,000+ members, 2,800 have experienced, are experiencing or will experience some form of depression in their lifetime. Here's the reality—you are not alone.

What happens to depression left untreated?

There are a number of very effective treatments for depression, including counseling and medications. However, denial and failure to treat depression can lead to suicide. According to the American Association of Suicidology, in 2010, there were 38,364 suicides in the U.S. (105.1 suicides per day; 1 suicide every 13.7 minutes). This finding translates to an annual suicide rate of 12.43 per 100,000 people. Alarmingly, suicide was the third leading cause of death for youth ages 15-24. The rate of suicide for this group was 10.45 per 100,000 people.

Recent headlines have also highlighted a number of Christians who succumbed to death by their own hands. Suicide is real.

Risk factors for suicide include some combination of depression and/or other mental health conditions: hopelessness, worthlessness, feeling trapped, fear of aging, substance abuse, chronic illness/pain and struggles with sexuality. Persons contemplating suicide may engage in impulsive behavior, give away prized possessions and withdraw from others. Contrary to what many believe, asking someone about suicidal thoughts does NOT increase the risk, but in many instances facilitates the healing and recovery process.



Spiritual counseling, prayer, and encouragement are always appropriate. However, you should also seek an evaluation by a mental health professional, just as you would seek medical attention for medical conditions. Contact your doctor, Employee Assistance Program (EAP) or insurance company. Also dial 2-1-1, the United Way hotline for community referral services.

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While cradling your bundle of joy for the first time, thoughts of your child's future flood your mind. Will they become president of the United States? Will they become a chief financial officer of a Fortune 500 company? A college education can be an important step toward building a successful future. How should families plan for the expense of a college education?

First, parents should think about the cost of a college education well in advance of high school. Let's face it! College is expensive and someone has to pay for it. Your first step should be to save as much as possible. Long-term planning can help make the process easier and more affordable. Very few parents have a savings plan for college because current expenses often take precedence over long-term goals, however, any amount saved will be beneficial in the end. Many states have 529 education savings plans and local banks can also assist with a college savings plan that will work within your family budget.

As your child grows, his or her talents will become apparent. Scholarship opportunities (athletic, academic, leadership, etc.) could be an option for your child. Parents and students often pour time and energy into sports, hoping for a college scholarship, but academic achievement is even more important. Help your student develop good study habits and set aside proper study time. Encourage your student to participate in a college prep curriculum in high school, and take advantage of other programs such as ACT and SAT test preparation. Also, encourage them to be involved in a wide range of activities that provide a variety of experiences and leadership opportunities. Taking active steps to invest in your child's academic and social development will help ensure college-readiness.

The most commonly discussed college costs are those paid directly to a chosen school for tuition, fees, room, meals and books. However, they are not the only costs that should be considered. For example, transportation costs, if your student attends a school out of state and personal expenses such as laptops, clothing, memorabilia, supplies and entertainment should also be considered. Further, while your student attends college, continue to explore ways to reduce expenses. Consider purchasing used textbooks and a suitable meal plan to eliminate waste and overpayment.

If you do not have sufficient savings to cover the costs, here are some tips to help pay for college expenses:



- 1. Get to know your high school's guidance counselors as well as your college financial aid administrators. Identify the best contact for questions, and obtain business cards
- whenever possible. Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid 2. (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov. This will open the door to federal and state financial aid.
- 3.
- Keep a file of your college documents and records. Inquire with the financial aid office to determine if your 4. college offers a payment plan. You may be able to pay installments instead of paying a lump sum.
- 5. If you opt to borrow money to pay for college expenses, pay close attention to the terms. Federal Direct Stafford Loans typically have the best terms and benefits. Know your rights and responsibilities as a borrower. Loans should always be your last option for funding.
- 6. Inquire about scholarship opportunities, and apply for any scholarships that seem to be a good match for your student.
- Know the important deadline dates for priority scholarship 7. consideration or priority FAFSA consideration. Make sure you thoroughly follow any instructions for applications, and submit all required information.
- Remember to be polite when asking for help or when inquiring about additional scholarships or grants. 8.

As a father with two daughters, one of my biggest challenges is maintaining the understanding that nothing is too complicated to discuss with dad. Just as we strive to master communication in the world, the same thing applies to the family structure. TAKE CONTFOL OF HIGH ENERGY BILLS: GO Green!

It's been an unusually cold winter nationwide. Did the cost of your monthly electric and gas bills make you want to scream? Do you often feel you are at the mercy of the utility company and there is nothing you can do? Don't despair! As the summer months approach, lowering your electric bill through energy conservation will keep you in control of the cost.

> Today, efforts to reduce, reuse and recycle are increasing, which means that going green and energy efficiency is becoming more and more important. Not only does efficient energy use save money, but it also protects, conserves and keeps the energy supply affordable for future generations. There are many choices we can make to increase energy efficiency in our homes. Let's review a few energy saving tips.

Heating and Cooling

• Set thermostats at 78 degrees or higher in the summer months and 68 degrees or lower in the winter months.

• Have heating and cooling units serviced every year. Servicing typically includes a check of refrigerant levels, the compressor, hoses, ductwork and the thermostat.

- Clean or replace air filters monthly
- Invest in a programmable thermostat.
- Use a ceiling fan to circulate air down in the summer months.

Appliances

- Avoid overloading the dryer to reduce drying time.
- Wash full loads of clothes and use cold water when possible.
- Clean the dryer lint filter before each load.
- Operate the dishwasher when it is completely full.

 Perform the dollar bill test to check the door seals on your refrigerator. Close your refrigerator door on a lollar bill, and then try to pull it out. If the dollar comes out easily, you may need new seals or a new efrigerator.

Around the House

• Prevent air leaks by weather-stripping doors and caulking windows.

• If your water heater is located an unheated space, wrap an insulated blanket around it to prevent heat loss (electric water heaters only).

- Use less hot water by installing low-flow showerheads.
- Close the fireplace damper when it is not in use.
- Repair leaky faucets. A leaky faucet can waste up to 48 gallons of water in one week.

• To keep water pipes from freezing in the winter, insulate water pipes or keep cabinet doors open.

• Maintain sufficient attic insulation.

• Use energy-efficient compact fluorescent bulbs. They only use one-quarter the energy of incandescent bulbs and last 10 times longer. NOTE: incandescent bulbs are no longer manufactured in the USA.

- Turn off lights in unoccupied rooms.
- Keep light fixtures and light bulbs clean. Dust absorbs 50 percent of light.

Home improvement stores offer do-it-yourself workshops to help with your energy needs. Also, contact your local utility companies to find out if they offer energy saving tips and do-it-yourself energy audits. Some utility companies offer free energy saving kits.

Following these energy saving tips can make a tremendous impact on reducing your electric bill. Let's GO GREEN!

Before GPS and Google Maps, American families planned their travel routes with a foldable map of the United States. Maps could be purchased at local gas stations or grocery stores. However, from the early to mid-1900s, cross-country travel posed a threat of danger for African-American families visiting loved ones in the segregated South.

As the cost of vehicles became affordable, African-American families hit the highways. As a result, states enacted more Jim Crow laws, which made travel difficult for African-Americans. Families took precaution as they strategically planned their travel routes to account for the absence of hotel and restaurant accommodations. Despite the odds, African-Americans continued to take the risk as they pursued travel to destinations across the United States.

Soon, African-American business owners began forming a network, a first generation AAA, of restaurants, rooming houses, gas stations and tourist attractions. Victor H. Greene, a postal worker and travel agent in Harlem, New York, captured the upsurge by creating and printing a travel guide specifically for African-Americans entitled *The Negro Motorist Green Book*.



Printed from 1949 until 1966, the *Green Book* listed sights and accommodations across America as well as Canada, Mexico and parts of the Caribbean. For example, families could stay at the Duck Inn in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, eat at the Dreamland Restaurant in Savannah, Georgia or visit Riverside Park in Chicago, Illinois. The publication sold 15,000 copies annually until its final printing.

While the need for the book diminished after the Civil Rights Act of 1967, its legacy remains. In 2011, playwright Calvin Alexander Ramsey wrote a play called *The Green Book* about a family who planned to stay at a hotel, but when they arrived, the hotel had a "No Negroes Allowed" sign posted in the lobby. He also wrote a children's book entitled *Ruth and the Green Book* about a family who uses the *Green Book* to navigate their trip to the South.

The *Green Book* was a publication with a purpose. Victor Green gave African-American families a key to the open road, freeing them to travel across the country with dignity.
